

LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Nothing worth having comes easy. The past two years have given all of us reason to fight for what is meaningful to us, and to prioritize what should matter most in our lives. For many of us, home and family have become more important to us than ever before. And building stronger families through affordable housing is what Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis is all about.

Becoming a Habitat Saint Louis homebuyer is definitely something worth having that doesn't come easy. Potential homebuyers must put in 350 hours of sweat equity, make a modest down payment, and commit to paying down an affordable mortgage before they can turn the key on their new home. One thing I've learned over the years as the CEO of Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis is that people are not afraid to roll up their sleeves to work hard for the outcome they want. Our partner families are strong, determined, and capable; so are people like you, who invest in our mission to build homes, communities and hope right here in our own backyard.

There were many challenges to being a non-profit homebuilder in 2021. Supply chain issues sometimes determined our construction schedule, as did ongoing pandemic social distancing measures, which often limited the number of volunteers, subcontractors, and staff we could have on the build site. Through it all, our community has adapted with us so we can continue keeping our promise to help low-income, hard-working families in St. Louis to build and buy their first home.

For every challenge, there was also something worth celebrating. **We broke ground in a brand new development in The Gate District** – an up and coming neighborhood on the south side of St. Louis, where affordable housing options are needed as never before. Six families were able to close on their Habitat Saint Louis homes, beginning a new life of greater financial and social stability, where they can get involved with their community, and their children will grow up feeling safe. Our Family Services department worked tirelessly with existing homebuyers in our program to ensure that they had the resources they needed to weather the pandemic; to date, not a single Habitat Saint Louis homebuyer lost their home due to the pandemic – and I'm so proud of our partner families for this accomplishment!

It is my privilege to be able to share the 2021 Annual Report with you. The successes outlined in the pages of this publication are made possible because you share our goal of creating a community where everyone has a safe, decent, affordable place to call home. Thank you for making our work possible, and for helping families of modest means in St. Louis to know the simple pleasure of *home*.

7,000+ - Calls from people seeking our assistance. For those callers who have determined they are ready to become homebuyers, we explain the steps needed to start the homebuying process and mail a pre-screen application to them. For those who feel they are not yet ready to become homebuyers or are searching for services Habitat for Humanity does not provide, we offer other available resources to steer them in the right direction



200+ - People who have gone through the pre-screen process and are working with our Family Services department to determine if homeownership through Habitat Saint Louis makes sense for them. Some may be working to improve their credit with one of our partner agencies; others may be ready to purchase a home through our programs, and are patiently waiting their turn. All of them are working closely with our staff to ensure that they will have the tools they need to succeed when the opportunity to purchase a home - whether through Habitat or other means - becomes available.



5% - The percentage of funding Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis receives from our parent organization, Habitat for Humanity International. We must raise 95% of the funding needed to build homes in our local community, and gifts given directly to the affiliate in St. Louis stay 100% in our regional economy.



1,700+ - The number of individuals who have found safe housing in one of more than 430 Habitat Saint Louis homes. Not only have these individuals found a secure, decent place to call home, they also found hope, independence, and social stability through Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis' homebuyer program.



6 - Families who closed on their homes in 2021. Before earning the keys to their new homes, homebuyers must complete a minimum of 350 sweat equity hours, make a modest down payment, and accept the responsibility of a 30-year affordable mortgage to complete the homebuying program




EXPENSES AND REVENUE

NET ASSETS: \$10,212,441 | SUPPORT & REVENUE: \$6,888,677 | EXPENSES: \$6,583,111






Year ended December 31, 2020 = \$4,464,318

GROWING SOLAR WITH AMEREN MISSOURI

Ameren Missouri pursued multiple opportunities to expand renewable energy generation and installed solar facilities in underutilized locations.

Ameren Missouri's first site built under their "Neighborhood Solar Program" is located at Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis headquarters and our ReStore South Side in South St. Louis. Three canopies provide shade and cover for Habitat Saint Louis' operations. The site went into service in August 2021.
