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A LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Running a non-profit construction company is never boring! I like to review the plans we had in place at the beginning of each year to see how they evolve over 12 months, because things always turn out a little differently than what we expect: new opportunities present themselves; challenges pop up unexpectedly; funding, materials, and even weather can help or hinder the goals we put in front of ourselves every January 1st. I can say with absolute assurance – I've never seen a year without a few surprises.

Coming out of the pandemic, 2022 was the first year in several that began to feel more like our old "normal," as we invited volunteers back to the build sites, and began interacting in-person more regularly. I cannot stress how important this has been for morale: Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis is a very social mission in which human interaction plays a key role to our success. It means so much to once again be working in person with people from the community, our partner families, and staff. We may build houses...but those houses are built for people, and human connections are at the heart of everything we do.

It was – inevitably – a year with some pretty significant challenges. While the viral threat of the pandemic was waning, the supply chain issues it created were still very present. We struggled to get items that had previously been donated; some companies that have been very generous to us in the past simply didn't have any surplus inventory to share. Some material costs went through the roof, while other construction necessities were not available. Most notably concrete was difficult to find, which made it impossible to pour as many foundations as we wanted to.

So as we always do, we adapted. By the end of the year, we had found enough concrete to pour four foundations and complete those houses. Four families closed on their homes and began a new life as homeowners, with equity in a lasting investment. Behind the scenes, we planned for a big year ahead in 2023, with faith we would once again have access to those materials which were scarce in 2022. (I'm happy to announce the concrete is flowing freely into the foundations of many new builds in 2023!)

Like I said, we always expect surprises at Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis: but one thing that we have always been able to rely on for 36 years and counting is the generous support of good people like you, who recognize the role that affordable housing plays in thriving families and a flourishing community. This report is a snapshot of how your investment translates into opportunity for low-income families in St. Louis who are making economic and social gains as first-time homeowners through our programs, supported by your contributions. Please take a little time to review this report and to learn more about our successes and challenges in 2022. When I remember these past few years, the first thing that will come to mind won't be the challenges we faced, but rather how people in St. Louis rose to the occasion to lift each other up in a difficult time. 7,250+ - Calls from people who are interested in learning more about the services we provide. For those who are not ready to take the first step towards purchasing a home, we offer referrals to other regional agencies more suited to their immediate needs. Those who are ready to begin the journey towards homeownership or are requesting home repairs are mailed a pre-screen application to begin the process of working their way through the steps to becoming a Habitat Saint Louis homeowner.



200+ - Habitat homebuyers and their families who interacted with the Family Services Department throughout the year. Some of them are members of the Ambassador Committee - a group of homebuyers who act as liaisons between the mission and partner families. Others participated in community projects and events sponsored by Habitat Saint Louis. Some needed assistance with home repair, financial counseling, or concerns in their neighborhoods. Others simply needed a sympathetic ear or a little advice. All of them found the support they needed to continue being successful homeowners now and for many years.



100% - **The amount of your donation that stays in St. Louis when your gift is made to our local affiliate.** Contrary to popular belief, Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis does not receive significant funding from our parent organization, Habitat for Humanity International – in fact, less than 5%. 1,700+ - People who've found hope, peace, and permanent shelter by living in a Habitat for Humanity Saint Louis home. Housing that is owned by its occupants creates greater generational wealth and economic stability for our homebuyers and their families.



4 -Families who closed on their homes in 2022. Each person on the deed of these homes performed 350 hours of sweat equity, took coursework, and made a modest downpayment before signing paperwork on a 30-year affordable mortgage. They are now building equity in an investment that will last a lifetime and beyond.






EXPENSES AND REVENUE

NET ASSETS: \$9,320,323 | SUPPORT & REVENUE: \$5,275,749 | EXPENSES: \$5,811,887




Year ended December 31, 2021 = \$6,888,677






HABITAT SAINT LOUIS HOME REPAIR PROGRAM
